COMMUNITY MEETING





We have been surrounded by so many thoughtful people throughout the years here at Camp Restore. I want to extend thanks to you all for your continued support of our staff and community. This past year we grieved with the family of Ms. Lorraine, our chef, on the passing of her husband of decades, Turk. You could always find Turk chopping vegetables and giving Lorraine advice in the kitchen. We all miss him.

We saw an unprecedented number of powerful hurricanes hit the US this past year. There was devastation in Houston, along with other cities in Texas from Hurricane Harvey. Then Hurricane Irma went up the Florida peninsula causing damage all of the way. Right on its heels was Hurricane Maria that tore into Puerto Rico. They still are working on restoring power to the island. We put out the word online that Camp Restore would collect money to help in these areas, passing it all along to help in recovery work.

Between mail and online donations and our first local fish-fry fundraiser, we received more than \$30,000, 100% of which is being passed along to our partners working to help affected families. So far, among donor-designated Hurricane Harvey funds, \$10,000 went to the Texas District LCMS, \$10,000 to the Cajun Army, \$3,000 to Rev. Stephen DeMik and Cypress Chapel, and \$3,000 to LINC Houston. \$400 was sent to the Florida District LCMS for Hurricane Irma, and \$3,000 to American Baptist Missions in Puerto Rico.

We have reached out willing to share what expertise we have gained through the years to help in whatever ways that we can. The number of groups and people from Texas, Florida, and Puerto Rico through the years who have helped us in New Orleans has been great. In return we want to support the recovery efforts in these areas in whatever way that we can. Your gifts have been a great start in doing that. Thank you.

BOARD ACTIONS

During the past few months the Board of Directors of RAI Ministries, which operates Camp Restore and the Senior Centers in the Lower Ninth Ward and New Orleans East, has been looking at the long-term positioning of our work. One of the strategic outcomes of their efforts has been the establishment of three new funds. First is the Walt Schmudlach Fund, which will provide materials assistance to homeowners who need some help in order to get work done on their homes. Second is a Capital Fund for capital projects at Camp Restore here in New Orleans. Finally, we have the Strategic Initiative Fund. This fund will allow us to help entities, such as Camp Restore - Baton Rouge and Camp Restore - Detroit, build their operations as they seek to address the challenges that their particular communities are given. It will especially be helpful to those who are just starting to reach out into their communities.

NOW OVER 150 COMMUNITY PARTNER ORGANIZATIONS

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WK KELLOGG YMVP GRANT PROGRESS UPDATE

In 2015 RAI Ministries received a grant from the WK Kellogg Foundation's Young Men's Voices Have Power initiative. Over the past two years, four New Orleanian young men have teamed up with experts in the fields of film-making and storytelling who are coaching them as they develop film projects with a target release in Summer 2018. As part of their training, so far our interns have also contributed to collaborative film projects with three other local nonprofit programs: Evacuteer, Future Icons of NOLA and The Gumbo Project.



Alongside our interns' media projects, we've also spent the past two years conducting a survey exploring whether we can measure the positive effects of volunteering on volunteers themselves, with the help of a random sampling of our volunteer base. We hope to determine whether serving in our context has additional benefits to volunteers that were not previously measured or identified, beyond the many powerful anecdotes we've gathered over the years.

We completed the survey phase in August and are now processing the data, with support from graduate students from the University of New Orleans and Loyola University, New Orleans.
